Welcome: We are glad everyone is here. We focus on three things: connecting with God, connecting with each other, and serving our world. In other words, this group does not exist for us.

Before we introduce ourselves, let's remember:

- This is a safe place to grow spiritually.
- We are a wide diversity of Truth seekers. We are glad all of you are here.
- You will notice we do not use a bunch of fancy religious language.
- We do not try to impress people with how much Bible quoting we can do. We are common people.
- Please be sensitive so everyone has an opportunity to share and contribute.
- Cell phones should be put on "vibrate," or turned off.

Check-In:

- 1. What is your first name?
- 2. What is a high-light or a low-light (a headline) from your week?
- 3. [*Insert rotation question for the week.*]

Rotation Questions: Rotate through the following three questions:

Week 1: How would you like to simplify your life?

Week 2: How would you like to re-prioritize your life?

Week 3: How would you like to cultivate a deeper relationship with God.

Week 4: How would you like to simplify your life?

Week 5: etc.

At the end of check-in ask the person who facilitated to choose another adult to facilitate check-in next week. Anyone can facilitate check-in. It does not have to be a CORE leader.

Children's Check-In Questions: How did you help Mommy or Daddy this week? (Or they can answer the adult questions.)

The Quiz: A child asks three questions. They randomly choose from the check-in questions people just answered. Ask everyone to raise their hands and the child picks someone to answer the questions.

For example:

- 1. What was his (pointing to the person) highlight for the week?
- 2. What was her name (pointing to the person)?
- 3. How did she want to simplify her life?

At the end of the quiz ask the child who facilitated to choose another child to facilitate the quiz next week.

This is what page 2 of a typical leader's guide for a given week actually looks like.

Facilitator's Directions:

- 1. Talk as little as possible, encourage others to share, and avoid a monologue.
- 3. Keep this top part and the bottom part (question D) of this page.
- 4. Reassure people they do not have to answer the questions, just read it for us.
- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question: (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle)

Bridge: This transitions the group from the Kick-off Question into the Bible story.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Bible story reference will be listed here. (*Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible during our discussion.*)

Digging Questions: (50% of your study time)

Some helpful pointers for digging questions:

- Remember: there are no "right answers" to relational Bible study questions. Help people contribute their perspective to the dialogue.
- You DO NOT have to "accomplish" all the questions listed. Use them as a resource from which to select during your discussion.
- Spend a maximum of 50% of your Bible study time on these questions.
- Affirm each answer, no matter what is said, by saying something like, "Excellent, someone else"; "Thanks for sharing, someone else"; "Good, someone else"; "How about the rest of you, what do you think".
- Did you catch the common denominator, "someone else"? You are always affirming and always inviting others to give input.
- If someone gets off-focus, simply say (after they have stopped talking), "What was the question? Let's read it again."

Sharing Questions: (50% of your study time)

Some helpful pointers:

- Spend a minimum of 50% of your time on these questions.
- These questions are designed to invite people to share portions of their life story as it interacts with the Bible study.
- At appropriate times affirm confidentiality and offer reassurance that this is a safe place to share and grow spiritually.

Group Prayer:

- 1. We are blessed by being a part of this group, yet it exists for those who are not yet here.
- 2. Put an Empty Chair in the middle of your prayer circle. Pray for the people who are not yet here.
- 3. Close by saying the Blessing Board blessing together.

At the end of prayer, ask the person who facilitated to choose another adult to facilitate the questions for next week. Anyone can facilitate the questions. It does not have to be a CORE leader.

Lunch:

- 1. Keep it simple. Keep it easily reproducible.
- 2. Hostess (one of the CORE4) provides the beans.
- 3. During lunch have the Taco Salad Sign-up Sheet available.

Bible Baptism

outline Mark 1:1-13

Message of Hope: God has sent someone to help you experience Jesus.

Needed for Today: This study will give people the opportunity to request baptism or request rebaptism. Have the Connections Card Envelopes printed and set out. There is a checkbox for people to request baptism or rebaptism. The Connection Card Envelopes are found in the **Drop Box**.

Breakfast

Welcome: We are so glad that you are here today.

Setting the Context:

- We come from a variety of backgrounds and seek to create a safe place for Truth seekers to grow spiritually.
- You will notice that we try to avoid fancy religious language. We are common people.
- Let's encourage those who like to talk to give opportunity for everyone to participate.

Check-In:

- 1. What is your first name?
- 2. What is a high-light or a low-light (a headline) from your week?
- 3. [*Insert rotation question for the week.*]

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The Quiz: A child asks three questions. They randomly choose from the check-in questions people just answered. Ask everyone to raise their hands and the child picks someone to answer the questions.

- 1. Talk as little as possible, encourage others to share, and avoid a monologue.
- 2. Cut on the dotted lines. Distribute questions around the circle. (%------)
- 3. Keep the top part and the bottom part (question D) of this page.
- 4. Reassure people they do not have to answer the questions, just read it for us.
- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question: (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle)

What do you think is one of the more important decisions you make in life?

Bridge: Today's story is about a very important decision, but it may not be what most people first think of. Mark gets right to the point about this. What is this decision? Let's read our story.

Bridge: Many movies have a war plot between a good guy and a bad guy. Today's story has a good guy and a bad guy, but it is not some make-believe movie plot. This story will introduce us to the real war that is going on in our world.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Mark 1:14-28

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions: (50% of your study time)

- 1. Back to verse 14, this story does not tell us, but why do you think John was arrested?
- 2. Let's read verses 16-22 again. What might have motived these people to walk away from their business to follow Jesus, and what do you think was different about Jesus's teaching that gave Him such authority?

Message of Hope: God is more powerful than demons.

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Kick-off Question: (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle) Who do you know that has served in a war?

Bridge: Believe it or not, each of us are part of a war that is going on right now. Today's story is a short story that has a big punch. It will give us a small glimpse into this global war that is going on around us. However, much of this war is invisible unless you know what you are looking for. Today's study is called *World War X*, so let's read it.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Mark 1:29-34 (Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions: (50% of your study time)

- 1. If this story had happened in our town, people would most likely be talking about it. Which part of the story do you think people would focus on?
- 2. Let's read verses 30-31 again. There is no verbal command to "be healed." Jesus just takes Simon's mother-in-law by the hand and the fever leaves. What might this tell us about Jesus?

- 3. A verse similar to verse 34 was in our story last week. How do you think the demons knew who Jesus was?

Sharing Questions: (50% of your study time)

- B. Simon took Jesus to his mother-in-law. If someone was going to bring Jesus to you, what would you wish Jesus would do for you?
- C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today?

There are all kinds of questions in life. But when a question pops into your mind, in general, how do you tend to go about finding answers to your question?

Bridge: Today's story is about something that more and more people are asking questions about. So, if you have not given it much thought before today, not a problem. Today's story is full of healing and special blessings that God established when He created this world. What are these special blessings? Let's read our story.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Mark 3:1-6

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions: (50% of your study time)

- 1. Why do you think the Pharisees were against Jesus and wanted to kill Him?
- 2. Why would healing be considered "working" on the Sabbath?
- 3. Where does the idea of not working on the Sabbath come from?

Tip (review from last week): Bookmark our story. Let's take a quick history tour.

Read Exodus 20:8-11 (part of the Ten Commandments)

Read Genesis 2:1-3 (part of creation, before sin entered this world)

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Kick-off Question: (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle)

What is the longest distance you have walked, hiked, or run at one time?

Bridge: Today's story begins with people who are walking from all over the countryside to one location. There are no cars or bikes; possibly some rode on horses or donkeys, but probably the majority of the people just walked. Why are they willing to walk such long distances? Let's read our story.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Mark 3:7-12

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions: (50% of your study time)

1. Let's re-read verses 7 and 8. Does anyone have maps in their Bible that show how big of an area people came from to see Jesus?

2. While it seems unlike Jesus, why do you think He wanted to keep His distance from the crowd?

A. Imagine that you had been hearing about Jesus. He is the talk of the city. How far would you have been willing to walk to see Jesus with your own eyes?

On the contrary, no food in and of itself can defile a person's character. What ethically defiles are the evil thoughts (realized in outward actions), which originate inside of a person. See note on Matthew 15:11. For the issue of clean and unclean in the New Testament, see Acts 10:9–16; 15:19–20.

He hires help to take care of his vineyard while he is gone. But the unexpected turn of events in the parable cause the religious leaders' discomfort when they understand the deeper meaning.

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

- 1. At what point in this story do you think the Pharisees realized the story was about them?

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Mark 13:1-23

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

1. Now that we have the big picture, let's read this story again, one verse at a time, and see if we can determine if each sign is referring to the destruction of Jerusalem, the end of the world, or to both.

Today's story continues with tips so that we do not get tricked, and then this story ends with hope and one of the best promises.

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

- 1. Verse 43 suggests that Jesus knew Judas had arrived even before everyone else knew. How do you think Jesus knew His betrayer had arrived?

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When was one of the last times the electricity and lights went out and everything was dark?

Bridge: In today's story the lights go out at noon, and everything becomes dark. Some people may have wondered what had happened, and others knew something supernatural was happening.

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Risky Business

outline Mark 15:42-47

Message of Hope: The cross of Jesus gives hope to rich and poor, male and female.

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Kick-off Question: (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle)

What is a risk, small or large, that you have taken in life?

Bridge: Today's story is about risk-taking. We often think about risk-taking in the context of business, but today's story is going to focus our attention on another kind of risk-taking that is much more difficult, where a lot more is at stake, and the personal reward and loss is much greater.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Mark 15:42-47 (Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.) **%**-----**Digging Questions:** (50% of your study time) 1. We are not told a lot about Joseph. Does your Bible have any additional footnotes or cross-references talking more about him? What were the risks that Joseph took when he asked Pilate for Jesus's body? **%**-----2. Why do you think Mark begins this story by emphasizing that "this all happened on Friday, the day of preparation, the day before the Sabbath"? **%-----**3. What do you think is significant about the Roman officer's confirmation that Jesus was indeed dead? **%-----**4. Mary Magdalene shows up in today's story, in last week's story, and in next week's story. Why do you think Mark continues to highlight her presence, when others are not mentioned? **%-----Sharing Questions:** (50% of your study time) A. This story includes risky choices by several people—Pilate, Joseph, Mary. On a personal note, if you were to take a risky step to stand up for Jesus like Joseph did, what could you lose and what could you gain? B. If you had had been one of the two Mary's that saw where Jesus was buried, what do you think you would have done next? C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today? D. Remember: The cross of Jesus gives hope to rich and poor, male and female. How can

Message of Hope: The empty tomb invites all of us to follow and obey Christ.

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Kick-off Question: (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle) What is something you like to find empty?

Bridge: There are many things we do not like to find empty. But some things are better found empty than full. Today's story is one awesome example of something that is better found empty.

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

Digging Questions: (50% of your study time)

1. In verse 1, Mark includes Salome. What additional information do your Bible's footnotes and cross-references say about this person?

- 2. Mark starts this story by saying it was Saturday evening when the Sabbath ended. Most people think the day changes at midnight. But in this story, it states that it was after the Sabbath, Saturday evening, when they went to buy burial supplies. How do you make sense of this difference? Why do you think this is pertinent to highlight this detail?
- 3. Let's read verses 7 and 8 again. Why do you think Jesus mentions Peter by name?
- 4. Verse 7 says that Jesus had told them He would meet them in Galilee after He had risen. Where does Mark record Jesus actually saying this, and what would be significant about this prophecy?

Sharing Questions: (50% of your study time)

A. On a personal note, if you had watched Jesus die, seen His body be taken down from the cross and buried in the tomb, and then discovered an empty tomb on Sunday morning, what do you think you would have done?

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- B. What kinds of things soften your heart and draw you close to Jesus?
- C. What is an invitation, a promise, a command, or a warning that you needed to hear today?
- D. Remember: **The empty tomb invites all of us to follow and obey Christ.** How can this group pray for you this week?

Believed & Baptized

outline Mark 16:9-20

Message of Hope: Even though the disciples were slow to believe, God did not give up on them.

Tip: Today's story will invite people to prepare for baptism or rebaptism in the coming weeks. Be sure to have a small stack of Connection Card Envelopes to share with everyone. And be sure to have the box on the table so people know where to put the Connection Card at their own leisure.

Breakfast

Welcome: We are so glad that you are here today.

Setting the Context:

- We come from a variety of backgrounds and seek to create a safe place for Truth seekers to grow spiritually.
- You will notice that we try to avoid fancy religious language. We are common people.
- Let's encourage those who like to talk to give opportunity for everyone to participate.

Check-In:

- 1. What is your first name?
- 2. What is a high-light or a low-light (a headline) from your week?
- 3. [*Insert rotation question for the week.*]

At the end of check-in ask the person who facilitated to choose another adult to facilitate check-in next week. Anyone can facilitate check-in. It does not have to be a CORE leader.

Children's Check-In Questions: How did you help Mommy or Daddy this week? (Or they can answer the adult questions.)

The Quiz: A child asks three questions. They randomly choose from the check-in questions people just answered. Ask everyone to raise their hands and the child picks someone to answer the questions.

- 1. Talk as little as possible, encourage others to share, and avoid a monologue.
- 3. Keep the top part and the bottom part (question D) of this page.
- 4. Reassure people they do not have to answer the questions, just read it for us.
- 5. At the end, choose someone to facilitate the questions for next week.

Kick-off Question: (60 second answers, facilitator goes first, go around the circle)

What is something you believe strongly in, even if others do not agree with you?

Bridge: Today's story is the last story in the book of Mark. He has told the stories, presented the evidence for Jesus Christ, and invited people to follow Jesus. Jesus has died, rested in the grave on Sabbath, and been raised from the grave. After all this, it is hard to believe that Jesus's own disciples had a hard time believing—that gives all of us hope.

Read the Bible Story from two different translations: Mark 16:9-20

(Encourage people to stick to this story instead of jumping all over the Bible.)

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Digging Questions: (50% of your study time)

- 1. Notice who Jesus appeared to and the order in which He appeared to them. Why do you think Jesus did not begin with the eleven disciples?
- 2. Let's read verses 15-18 again. How many times is the word "will" or "shall" used in these verses?
- 3. How and where do we see these kinds of things happening around us in today's world?
- 4. Why does Mark emphasize and link believing with being baptized?

Sharing Questions: (50% of your study time)

- A. On a personal note, if Jesus had lived in our lifetime, who do you think He would send you to tell? Why?
- B. Being slow to believe is not wrong; we see the evidence of the disciples being slow to believe. But eventually each person has to decide. What has helped convince you or what has helped make you a stronger believer in Jesus Christ?

Tip: Mark connects believing with baptism. There may be someone here that would like to prepare for baptism. Or maybe there is someone who has already been baptized, has then gone their own way for a while, and would like to be rebaptized. Take one of these Connection Card Envelopes and check the box that talks about baptism. Put it in the box on the table and we will plan a special time for your baptism or rebaptism.
